Norton Owners Club International Rally Bremen Germany

This month I was lucky enough to be able to attend the NOC Rally in Bremen, my wife Sandra and I departed Oldmeldrum on the 12th August having loaded my Commander Rotary with a tent and all the equipment needed for a week of camping; we had planned to stay the night in Cramlington before catching the Newcastle/Ijmuiden DFDS ferry next day, the run down to Cramlington was very wet and windy in particular the Forth Road Bridge and the City By-Pass once onto the A68 and A697 the weather improved but remained wet.

Once in Holland our route was to take us past Groningen and Oldenburg before reaching Bremen, we decided to go over what they call the dyke which in fact is a very long bridge, an impressive feat of engineering, crossing the Ijsselmeer Sea.

We arrived in Bremen on Thursday the 14th meeting up with two friends from Aberdeen and the ex Chairman of the Morpeth NOC who we met at the National Rally last year.

The Bremen branch of the NOC had done an excellent job in providing a number of runs to some fascinating places in particular the "Bunker

Valentine" a huge concrete structure built during the 2nd world war for the construction of a new type of submarine, fortunately the RAF managed to inflict sufficient damage so that the bunker never saw the completion of a submarine.

We also took part in a run to Bremerhaven on the way following the River Weser and passing through some very appealing and picturesque villages.

On Sunday the 17th all attendees assembled with their bikes in the Bremen town square, apparently the organisers of the rally had to convince the town council that we would not spoil the square and in particular we were not to ride our bikes across the centre of the square, although we could push them, I am not sure what the difference was between pushing and riding but in any case I suspect it took the local NOC branch considerable effort to persuade the council to let us use the square.

Once assembled our bikes drew large crowds to view what was some fine examples of the output of the Norton factory, by far the best bikes were those from Germany, perhaps because they had not had to travel large distances to get there, but in any case the finish and detail of the bikes was excellent.

My bike won best rotary and below are just a few of the many photos taken during the trip.


